# ADVENT WREATH LIGHTING | HOPE

I know that may seem a strange, dark story to read as a beginning to "the Cycle of Light," a season of uncovering the origins of our faith. Hans Christian Andersan's story feels more like an end. Though, it is an end that takes place and casts a vision for a new beginning.

Truth be told, all stories that are ends to beginnings and beginning to some different end, are a bit strange, a bit *apocalyptic*. And yet, as Karen Swallow points out,

"The biblical meaning of the Greek word translated into English as 'apocalypse' is simply an *uncovering* or *revelation*. We often associate apocalypse with the end of the world [for various reasons, but most commonly in our faith] because of the vision given in the book of Revelation [that we suppose is primarily] about future days. We also make this association because some moments of revelation in human, church, or personal history do seem like the end of the world. There are times [like] this particular historical moment—which has included crisis in the church, the first global pandemic in a century...a deep political polarization [, not to mention the turmoil in the Middle East (as Dr. J's billboard attests)]—seems to [herald] the end of the world [is here]. But perhaps it's only as the rock group R.E.M. put it, 'the end of the world as we know it.' And maybe that's fine.

[In this season, in our history, in the church calendar, and as our life together this year has entailed,] Many truths that have been hidden are being brought to light. Many deeds that have been covered up are being uncovered. Many assumptions that have been unexamined are being brought to the surface and scrutinized in order that we may consider whether they are rooted in eternal truths or merely in human traditions. In the process, Jesus is revealing more of himself. As he said to his Father [and we read last week] in Matthew 11:25[-30],

'You have hidden these things from the wise and understanding and revealed them to the little children, [yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. All things have been handed over to me by my Father, and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him. Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me...For my yoke is easy and my burden is light.']

It is significant that the word translated 'revealed' in [these] verses is the Greek word for 'apocalypse.' [Uncovering, revealing, an end to what we know, a beginning of a different,

deeper end to which we live.] Some of what is hidden from us is spiritual reality, divine truths that can be revealed to us only through God's divine power."<sup>2</sup>

Power that became a person, flesh and blood, birthed into the neighborhood, taking up and on the work of making a life. A person whose images, visions, and enlightenments of life now pointed us to life forever, whose way of life now embodies forever living, whose life given became and remains the hope of the end of what we know (an existence with as much separation, suffering, and sin (off the mark), as something different), a hope that is the arrival of what will be is far greater than what we can ask (put on our wish lists) or imagine (in our grandest tales):

God can do anything, you know - far more than you could ever imagine or guess or request in your wildest dreams! He does it not by pushing us around but by working within us, his Spirit deeply and gently within us.

Glory to God in the church! Glory to God in the Messiah, in Jesus! Glory down all the generations! Glory through all millennia! Oh, yes! (Ephesians 3:20-21)

#### [WHILE LIGHTING THE CANDLE, SAY:]

## SCRIPTURE READING | Matthew 11:1-10 (MSG)

"Is this what you were expecting? Then count yourselves most blessed!" When John's disciples left to report, Jesus started talking to the crowd about John.
